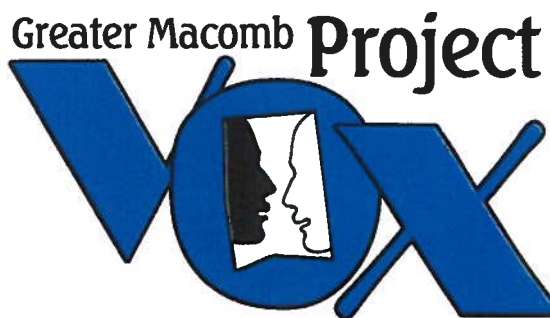

Proclamation Regarding National Recovery Month

Mental and substance use disorders affect all communities nationwide, but with commitment and support, people with these disorders can achieve healthy lifestyles and lead rewarding lives in recovery. In 2011, 2.3 million people aged 12 or older received specialty treatment for an illicit drug or alcohol use problem in the past year, and 31.6 million adults aged 18 or older received mental health services in the past year. By seeking help, people who experience mental and/or substance use disorders can embark on a new path toward improved health and overall wellness.

The focus of National Recovery Month (Recovery Month) this September is to celebrate their journey. Recovery Month spreads the message that behavioral health is an essential part of health and one's overall wellness, and that prevention works, treatment is effective, and people recover.

This is a message we need to spread far and wide. The impact of mental and substance use disorders is apparent in our local community, and an estimated XX [Thousand/Million] people in [City or State] are affected by these conditions. According to the 2011 National Survey on Drug Use and Health, in 2011, 21.6 million people aged 12 or older nationwide needed treatment for an illicit drug or alcohol use problem (8.4 percent of people aged 12 or older). Of these, 2.3 million (0.9 percent of people aged 12 or older and 10.8 percent of those who needed treatment) received treatment at a specialty facility. Also in 2011, out of the 45.6 million Americans aged 18 or older who had any mental illness in the past year, only 31.6 million received mental health services in the past year. Through Recovery Month, people become more aware and able to recognize the signs of mental and/or substance use disorders, which can lead more people into needed treatment. Managing the effects of these conditions can help people achieve healthy lifestyles, both physically and emotionally.

For 24 years, Recovery Month has worked to improve the lives of those affected by mental and/or substance use disorders by raising awareness of these diseases and educating communities about the prevention, treatment, and recovery resources that are available. For the above reasons, I am asking the citizens of [City or State] to join me in celebrating this September as National Recovery Month.

Ty Hilgendorf was present to represent Advance America. It was noted that although the business license application indicates they are applying for a Precious Metal License, the letter requesting a license uses the language Secondhand Dealer License. Ty stated they are only interested in applying for a Precious Metal License. Their primary business is payday lending and he

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explained they plan to accept gold for payment but will not resell it. After some discussion on this business, Member Morelli suggested a letter of clarification from the company indicating their intent is for a precious metals license only.

Juanita Parker, 16442 Clarkson, voiced her opinion on this item.

Member Jennings moved, seconded by Member Morelli, TO APPROVE A PRECIOUS METALS LICENSE FOR ADVANCE AMERICA, LOCATED AT 31900 GROESBECK HWY, FRASER, MI, WITH THE STIPULATION THEY PROVIDE A LETTER CLARIFYING THEY ARE REQUESTING A PRECIOUS METALS LICENSE ONLY.

Member Cilluffo shared his concern with the process of notifying Council regarding the interest in purchasing these properties. Member Haberman advised he will review the process and develop procedures in the event this situation comes up again. Member Carnegie suggested all fees associated with the purchase be included in the costs in the future. He also suggested placing a timeline clause in the event the developer does not bring property up to code or develop in a timely manner. Attorney Tomlinson cautioned on doing this but instead suggested code enforcement be notified.

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- d. **Request Council approve a request for a parade permit for the Fraser Homecoming Parade scheduled for October 11, 2013.**

Member Accavitti moved, seconded by Member Blanke, to APPROVE A REQUEST FOR A PARADE PERMIT FOR THE FRASER HOMECOMING PARADE SCHEDULED FOR OCTOBER 11, 2013.

The motion carried unanimously.

- e. **Request Council approve or reject proposal(s) received for redevelopment of the “Dairy Queen” property located at 33080 Groesbeck.**

Members Cilluffo and Jennings noted the only proposal the City received was from Mr. Jeff Fiore in the amount of \$10,000. He originally offered \$15,776, the same amount the City paid for the property and they prefer he go back to his original bid.

Mayor Hagerty stated the value of the corner is \$200,000 and he believes it is in the best interest of the taxpayers to have the building demolished and keep the land for future development in order to control the corner.

Jeff Fiore advised he can adjust his bid and return it to the original amount but was concerned that he paid for plans and there were delays.

Member Jennings noted no one else bid on this property and Mr. Fiore provided a creative plan for a virtually unbuildable property.

Mayor Hagerty read a portion of the background information provided with the proposal packet and noted his concerns relative building on this property. Manager Haberman explained the condition listed regarding variances and waivers only exist if over 50% of replacement cost and Mr. Fiore noted the footprint will essentially remain with only the roof being removed.

Anna Cameron, 34273 Garfield Circle, voiced her opinion on this item.

Member Jennings moved, seconded by Member Morelli, to APPROVE THE AMENDED PROPOSAL OF \$15,776 FOR REDEVELOPMENT OF THE “DAIRY QUEEN” PROPERTY LOCATED 33080 GROESBECK.

The motion 6-1 with
one no vote by Mayor Hagerty.

9. **Report of City Administration/Pending Items**

Manager Haberman advised a septic system failure at 32200 Fruehauf was reported. The homeowner’s only option is to connect to city water at an approximate cost of \$15,000. Manager Haberman asked Council if they would consider providing assistance to the homeowner by allowing time payments such as a special assessment or placing a lien on the property.

Manager Haberman advised there are additional homes in the city with septic systems but is unsure of the number. Mayor Hagerty stated he is concerned since he does not know how many homeowners may need this type of agreement.

Eric Oliver, 32200 Fruehauf, explained that he has lived in the home for 3½ years. When they purchased the house they had the well repaired instead of disconnected. Over the last six weeks, the field is not draining properly.

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Member Cilluffo stated this may be a homeowner's responsibility and is concerned this type of arrangement may set a precedence to become financially involved in future properties. He also inquired about Mr. Olivier's water bill and Eric stated he only pays for water, no fixed charge or sewer fees.

Member Blanke would like the City Manager to review and provide the number of other properties that this could affect. She compares this with tax tribunal cases and budgeting for hardships.

After further discussion, Manager Haberman advised he will provide additional information regarding the number of homes not connected to city sewers so Council can review and make a decision relative to this request.

On another subject, Manager Haberman advised there is a Veterans Stand Down Macomb on September 19, 2013 at the Macomb Sports & Expo Center.

Commissioner Kelley stated she would like more mom & tot programs and possibly a 5K fundraiser.

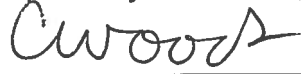

Call to order: 7 p.m. by Marilyn.

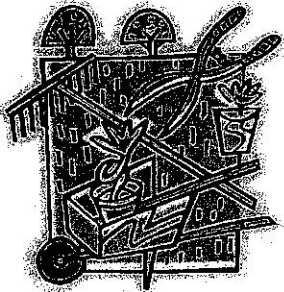

**DRAFT AMENDMENT
CITY OF FRASER CONSOLIDATED RETIREMENT SYSTEM**

- (1) Article II, Section 2.2 shall be amended and restated to add the following sections 2.10.1 and 2.10.2:

2.10.1 Purchase of Permissive Service Credit

Credited Service shall also include up to five (5) years of Permissive Service Credit purchased by Participants, who are actively employed by the City, with five (5) or more years of Retirement System service credit as permitted by the Internal Revenue Code Section 415(n)(3)(B) limitations. Permissive Service Credit is not connected to any specific prior employment. Permissive Service Credit is service credit recognized by the Retirement System to satisfy service credit requirements for retirement eligibility and is available only by making voluntary additional contributions in the amount necessary to fund the benefit attributable to such service credit. The amount paid for Permissive Service Credit may not be used for the purpose of calculating the final average salary; the Permissive Service Credit can only be used to satisfy service requirements for retirement benefit eligibility and to increase years of service used in calculating retirement benefits. Notwithstanding anything contained herein to the contrary, the five (5) year maximum Permissive Service Credit includes any service credited granted by the City in connection with any Early-Out retirement programs

A Participant must notify the Retirement System in writing of the intent to purchase Permissive Service Credit and pre-pay the actuarial fee for calculating the cost of the purchase. The Retirement System will then request its actuary to determine the cost for the purchase, prepare a purchase agreement and forward the purchase agreement to the Participant. The Participant will be responsible for 100% of the actual cost associated with the purchased Permissive Service Credit as determined by the Retirement System's actuary. A participant will have ninety (90) days from the date of the actuarial report setting forth the cost of the purchase, to elect and to pay for the Permissive Service Credit. The actuarial report setting forth the cost of the purchase will only be valid for ninety (90) days.

If a Participant terminates their employment and either elects or is only eligible for a refund of their Employee Contributions after the purchase of Permissive Service Credit, the amount paid for the Permissive Service Credit will also be refunded.

2.10.2 Payment for Permissive Service Credit.

(1) The Retirement System may accept as payment for Permissive Service Credit, an eligible rollover distribution from or on behalf of the Participant who is making payments for such service credit if the eligible rollover distribution does not exceed the amount of payment required for the service credit being purchased by the Participant. The eligible rollover distribution may be contributed to the retirement system by the Participant or directly transferred from the plan that is making the eligible rollover distribution on behalf of the Participant. Contribution by a Participant pursuant to this section may only be made in the form of a cash

contribution. For purposes of this section, an eligible rollover distribution means all or any portion of an amount that qualifies as an eligible rollover distribution under the Internal Revenue Code from:

(a) A plan of another employer which is qualified under section 401(a) or 403(a) of the Internal Revenue Code;

(b) An annuity contract or custodial account described in section 403(b) of the Internal Revenue Code;

(c) An eligible deferred compensation plan under section 457(b) of the Internal Revenue Code which is maintained by a governmental employer described in section 457(e)(1)(A) of the Internal Revenue Code; or

(d) An individual retirement account or annuity described in section 408(a) or section 408(b) of the Internal Revenue Code that is eligible to be rolled over to an employer plan under the Internal Revenue Code.

(2) The Retirement System may accept as payment for service credit that is purchased pursuant to this section, a direct trustee-to-trustee transfer from an eligible deferred compensation plan as described in section 457(e)(17) of the Internal Revenue Code on behalf of a Participant who is making payments for such service credit if the amount transferred from the eligible deferred compensation plan does not exceed the amount of payment required for the service credit being purchased and the purchase of such service credit qualifies as the purchase of permissive service credit by the member as defined in section 414(n)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

(3) The trustees may establish rules, regulations, and limitations on the eligible rollover distributions and direct trustee-to-trustee transfers that may be accepted by the Retirement System pursuant to this section, including restrictions on the type of assets that may be transferred to the Retirement System.

(4) Amounts contributed or transferred to the System pursuant to this section shall be deposited and held as a commingled asset of the System and shall not be separately accounted for or invested for the member's benefit.

(5) The System, the Trustees, and their respective members, officers, and employees shall have no responsibility or liability with respect to the federal and state income tax consequences of any contribution or transfer to the system pursuant to this section, and the trustees may require as a condition to the System's acceptance of any rollover contribution or transfer satisfactory evidence that the proposed contribution or transfer is a qualifying rollover contribution or trustee-to-trustee transfer under the Internal Revenue Code and reasonable releases or indemnifications from the member against any and all liabilities which may in any way be connected with such contribution or transfer.

2.10.3 Limitation on After-Tax Contributions for the Purchase of Permissive Service Credit

The Retirement System can accept after-tax contributions from a Participant during a limitation year only if:

(1) The voluntary additional contribution to be made by the member does not exceed the amount determined by the Retirement System to be necessary to fund the benefit attributable to such service credit; and

(2) The requirements of Internal Revenue Code (IRC) section 415(b) are met (without regard to any reductions for early retirement age), determined by treating the accrued benefit derived from all such contributions as an annual benefit for purposes of IRC section 415(b); or

(3) The requirements of IRC section 415(c)(1)(A) are met (without regard to the compensation limit), determined by treating all such contributions as annual additions for purposes of IRC section 415(c).

Re: Revised Zoning Ordinance – Precious Metals

Dear Mr. Haberman:

I have attempted to research thoroughly, the issue of regulating precious metal and gem dealers through zoning measures.

I have drafted a proposed ordinance which attempts to impose restrictions which are comprehensive. Businesses are limited to the CG business district and dispersal requirements of 500 feet are set forth. In addition, display cases must be provided with merchandise displayed unaltered for the nine day period required under the statute. Additional signage of the obligations of the dealer and rights of the public are required.

It is important to have Randy, Patrick Meagher, or someone else, analyze the locational restrictions against our zoning map. We need to make sure that adequate sites are available for this type of use. We can adjust the 500 feet, decreasing or increasing the number of feet, so that adequate sites are provided.

ORDINANCE NO. _____

TO ADOPT AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND REVISING IN THE CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 32 ZONING ADDING SECTION 32-136 REGULATING USES WITHIN THE COMMERCIAL ZONING WITH LOCATIONAL RESTRICTIONS TO AVOID SECONDARY AFFECTS AND PROVIDING FOR REPEALER, SEVERABILITY, PENALTIES, OTHER TERMS AND EFFECTIVE DATE

THE CITY OF FRASER ORDAINS:

Section 1. Purpose. The City of Fraser Code of Ordinances, Zoning Ordinance, is amended and revised to provide for the zoning precious metal businesses as licensed under Act 95 of 1981 as amended, MCLA 445.481 et seq. in order to preserve, protect and promote public health, safety and welfare and to promote and preserve the safe occupancy and property values of surrounding parcels and provide for the establishment and continuation of legitimate businesses engaged in the sale of precious metals and gems as regulated by the Act and to diminish the opportunity for the concealment of crimes resulting from the ability to receive and transfer stolen property easily and quickly and to allow for the display and viewing of precious metals and gems subject to the State Act allowing consumers and victims of theft a greater opportunity to view and compare items for sale, locate potential stolen items and have a greater awareness of their rights pursuant to the Precious Metal and Gem Dealer Act under state law.

Section 2. Sec. 32-136 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Fraser, Zoning Ordinance, is hereby adopted and added to read as follows:

Sec. 32-136. Uses within Commercial Zoning with Locational Restrictions to Avoid Secondary Affects.

It is recognized that certain uses as a result of their nature are subject to potential operational characteristics which may lead to attracting to the business persons who are in possession of and attempting to dispose of by sale or transfer, stolen property. It is further recognized that the Precious Metal and Gem Dealer Act, Public Act 95 of 1981 as amended, MCLA 445.481 et seq., was adopted in order to diminish the likelihood of precious metals and gems which are stolen from being sold or transferred. It is recognized that providing for the display of precious metals and gems received during the period of time such items are required to be retained and providing for signage advising consumers of their rights under the Act, as conditions for the permitted use will diminish the likelihood of theft and enhance the recovery of stolen items and protection of the public at large. It is further recognized that providing for the dispersal and maintaining locational restrictions for certain types of uses is a legitimate method of promoting and protecting public health, yet providing for the continued operation of such uses.

- (1) Precious Metal and Gem Dealer Business. Businesses which are subject to complying with the registration requirements of the Precious Metal and Gem Dealer Act , Public Act 95 of 1981 as amended, MCLA 445.481 et seq., shall only be permitted in the CG business district as a principal use, subject to the following requirements and conditions:
 - (a) Such use shall be permitted only in the CG business district, provided no portion of the property upon which such business is situated is within 500 feet of any of the following:
 - (1) A residentially zoned district.
 - (2) Property upon which a residential use exists.
 - (3) A church.
 - (4) A school.
 - (5) A business regulated under the Zoning Ordinance 32-145.
 - (6) A park.

- (7) Pool or billiard hall.
 - (8) Coin operated amusement centers.
 - (9) Roller skating rinks or ice rinks.
 - (10) Night clubs or dance halls permitting the congregation of persons under 21.
- (b) The method of measurement shall utilize the two property edges closes to each other measured with a direct line.
 - (c) The uses shall also be located such that there is at least 1,000 feet between uses which are subject to regulation and registration under the Precious Metal and Gem Dealer Act.
 - (d) Distance prohibitions are subject to waiver upon presentation to the Fraser Planning Commission of a valid petition requesting waivers signed by 51% or more of the following categories:
 - (1) Persons owning property within the restricted location area.
 - (2) Persons residing with or occupying dwelling units within the restricted location area.
 - (3) Persons or entities operating any of the uses described under 32-136(A) 1 through 10.
 - (e) Any proposed business subject to registration under the Precious Metal and Gem Dealer Act shall have available and in use at least 30 square feet of lighted display case area where precious metal and gems shall be displayed with full view by the public and access to the exterior of the display case area by the public, constituting a minimum of 30 square feet of display area. Upon receipt of a precious item subject to the act, the dealer shall display such item during the period of time for retention under the Act MCLA 445.485, without any form of alteration other than required to make an accurate appraisal of its value in the display case with full view by the public and access to the exterior of the display case area by the public during business hours and no less than eight hours each day, Monday through Friday.
 - (f) Conspicuous signs with lettering at least two inches high shall be posted setting forth the dealer's obligation to retain property and keep it in the display case area unaltered other than that required to make an accurate appraisal of its value under MCLA 445.485 and advising the public that a person who has a precious item stolen, embezzled, or converted, may bring an action for three times the amount of damages, cost of suit and reasonable attorney fees against any dealer who by himself or herself, or through his or her agent, or employee, received or purchased the precious item knowing it was stolen, embezzled, or converted.
 - (g) Nothing within this ordinance shall be deemed to relieve any person from full compliance with all applicable state laws or regulatory ordinances involving precious metal and gems, secondhand or used goods, or pawn broker activities.

Section 2. Repealer. All ordinances or parts of ordinance in conflict herewith are repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and affect.

Section 3. Severability. If any article, section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this ordinance is held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate distinct and independent provision, such holding shall not affect the validity of remaining portions of the ordinance, it being the intent of the City that this ordinance shall be fully severable.

Section 4. Effective Date. This ordinance is deemed to be an emergency ordinance and shall become effective upon adoption and publication.

Section 5. Penalty. Any violation of this ordinance shall subject any person to the same penalties and provisions as otherwise contained in the Zoning Code for any other violation of the Zoning Code.
